Word Work

Instructional Focus:
2-Syllable Long E Words

Background:
The long E sound means the letter E says its name: "ee". There are many ways to make that sound. Below are some of those ways:

1. **E by itself** – Like in **me** or **began**.
2. **EE together** – Like in **feel** or **bee**.
3. **Ea together** – Like in **eat** or **sea**.
4. **Ei together** – Like in **ceiling** or **receive**.
5. **I by itself** – Sometimes, when a word has an I, it says the long E sound.
6. **Y at the end of a word** – Sometimes, when a word has a Y at the end, it says the long E sound. Like in **silly** or **happy**.

A syllable is like a little sound chunk in a word. Even the word **eat** has two parts: **ea** and **t**. Some words have 1 syllable, like **cat**, or more.

- **2-syllable words** have two parts, like:
 - **un/der** – It has two parts: **un** and **der**.
 - **la/dy** – It has two parts: **la** and **dy**.When you say a word, you can clap for each part. When you say **eat**, you can clap for **ea** and **t**. Many words have more than one syllable.

Putting It All Together
Some 2-syllable words have a long E sound! Here's how:

- In **be/gan**, the first syllable **be** has the long E sound because the letter E says its name.
- In **sil/y**, the second syllable **-y** makes the long E sound because Y at the end of a word can sound like E.

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Step 1: Introduce the Focus of Word Work (continued)

Introduce 2-Syllable Long E Words

- Tell students that some 2-syllable words have a long E sound! Here's how:
 - In **be/gan**, the first syllable **be** has the long E sound because the letter E says its name.
 - In **sil/y**, the second syllable **-y** makes the long E sound because Y at the end of a word can sound like E.
- Write a couple 2-syllable long E words on the anchor chart. Put a slash between the 2 syllables in each word, and underline the letter(s) that makes the long E sound.
- Have students repeat the words. Encourage students to clap for each syllable to hear the 2 syllables in each word.
- Ask students if they can think of any other 2-syllable words with a long E sound. Add them to your anchor chart as students suggest them. Challenge students to identify the "break" in the word that shows the 2 syllables, and underline the letter(s) that makes that long E sound.

Step 2: Connect Word Work to Reading

2-Syllable Long E Words in the Text

- Tell students that the book they will be reading today has many 2-syllable words with a long E sound.
- Read aloud the **second page** of *The Sandwich Swap*.
- As you read, prompt students to hold up two fingers next to their ear when they hear a 2-syllable word with a long E sound.
- Write the words they hear on page 2 on the anchor chart (**be/gan, sea/nut, jelly**).
- Tell the students that you are going to read the book once from beginning to end. Tell them to listen and look for words that have 2 syllables and a long E sound. Remind them to be polite and not to interrupt you while you read.
- Read *The Sandwich Swap*.

Some examples of 2-Syllable Long E Words found in the text:

- **be/gan** • **pea/nut** • **la/dy**
- **sea/nut** • **feel/ings** • **row/dy**
- **jelly** • **equi/ly** • **U/y's**
- **sil/y** • **silly** • **yum/my**
- **pi/ta** • **stor/y** • **ver/y**
- **yuck/y** • **be/tween** • **chick/pa**
- **ick/y** • **cel/ing** • **goo/ey**

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Step 3: Guided Word Work Practice

Interactive Exploration

- Divide students into pairs.
- Provide each pair of students with a set of 2-syllable long E cards (cut the cards in advance) and a recording sheet.
- Tell students to spread their cards out in front of them so the text is facing up.
- Show students that each card has one syllable of a long E word.
- Show students how to match their cards to form 2-syllable words with the long E sound. For example, the card with the letters "pea" and the card with the letters "nut" can be combined to form the word "peanut".
- Inform students that each card has only one correct match.
- Show students how to record their words on the recording sheet and sort them by their spelling patterns that give the long E sound. Tell students that if a word fits into more than one spelling pattern, they should write the word under all of the patterns that apply to it.
- Explain that this activity works best if you talk with your partner and say each idea out loud.
- Their task, as a pair, is to match and record all of their cards correctly.
- Set a timer for the activity (15 - 20 minutes).
- Visit each pair as they work. Discuss the correct answers at the end of the activity with the whole group.

Step 4: Independent Word Work Practice

Practice Page

- Give each student a copy of **2-Syllable Long E Words practice page**.
- Read the directions with the class.
- Tell the students to complete the practice page.
- Monitor students while they work.

Step 5: Reconnect and Reflect on Word Work

Group Discussion

- Bring the students back together.
- Ask students to explain what they learned about words based on the work they completed.
- Invite students to turn and talk with a partner about their word work.
- Invite 2-3 students to share what they learned with the group.

2-Syllable Word Hunt
Extend Engagement Activity

Directions:

1. Give students some magazines that they can mark up.
2. Tell students that you will set a timer for 3 minutes.
3. Tell students that their task is to find as many 2-syllable words in their magazine as possible. When they find a 2-syllable word, they should circle it.
4. When the timer ends, students will share the words they found. If any of their 2-syllable words also have a long E sound, write them on the board.
5. Challenge the class to identify which letter(s) make the long E sound and where to place the syllable break (/) in the word.

For Fun:

- Tally the number of 2-syllable words each student finds.
- Tally the number of 2-syllable words each student finds that also have a long E sound.
- See who found the most 2-syllable words and who found the most 2-syllable words with long E sounds.
